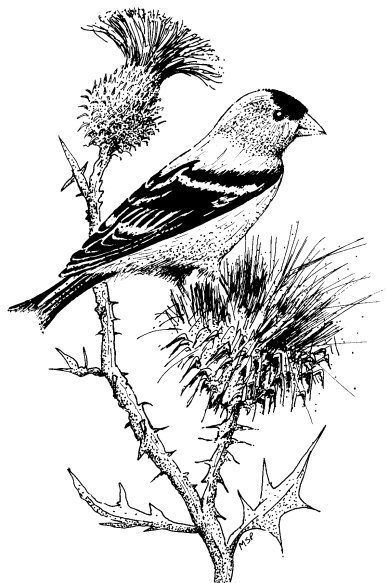

CLUB MEETINGS - BY JANE GEUDER

Thursday, March 10, 2011 “Enhancing Maryland’s Wood Duck Population One Nest Box at a Time,” by Cliff Brown. Cliff founded the Maryland Wood Duck Initiative in 2004. He will review the activities of this all-volunteer conservation organization and discuss a “best practices” approach to managed nest programs. The organization has had over 19,000 volunteer hours invested in its mission and has involved more than 500 kids in its projects. The Maryland DNR named Cliff Brown Conservationist of the Year in 2008.

Thursday, April 14, 2011 “Understanding the Complex Singing and Social Behavior of Wood Thrushes,” by Dr. Kim Derrickson. As associate professor of biology at Loyola University, he has published more than 20 scientific papers on several local species, most notably the Northern Mockingbird. In addition to evaluating parental care by male Wood Thrushes, he will update his findings on mockingbirds since he first shared information on their singing behavior with us 15 years ago.

AUTUMN BIRD RECORDS: AUGUST 1 – NOVEMBER 30, 2010

As usual, autumn produced many of the year’s best records. LeConte’s Sparrow, a new county species, led the list which included Black-bellied Plover, American Golden-Plover, American Avocet*, Ruddy Turnstone*, Western*, White-rumped, Baird’s*, and Stilt* sandpipers, Short-billed Dowitcher, Red Phalarope*, Short-eared Owl*, Alder Flycatcher, Sedge Wren, and Nelson’s Sparrow. (An asterisk indicates 10 or fewer county records; no asterisk 11 to 21.)

The earliest **Cackling Goose** report was 10/7 at Centennial (**JC**). A flock of ~40 **Snow Geese** flying south from the Patapsco at Woodbine 11/10 was noteworthy (**RSu**). **Tundra Swan** peak movement was 11/20-29. A m. **Gadwall** and a m. **Redhead** arrived at Lake Elkhorn 11/28 (**JW**); a f. **Northern Shoveler** appeared at Centennial 10/23 (**MKw**); 56 **Green-winged Teal** gathered at the north end of Triadelphia Reservoir (TRIRS) 11/3 (**JHf, RR**, new high count); and two **Greater Scaup** (1 f.) were

present at Centennial 11/29 (**JCr**, ph.). Two **Long-tailed Ducks** and three **Common Goldeneyes** were spotted at TRIRS 11/24 (**BHi**). A **Common Merganser** at Gateway in f. or juv. plumage on the peculiar date of 9/18 raises the question of whether it was a local bird (**ESu**, **RLb**).

Wild Turkey sightings from nine sites were received; the high was 12 at Circle D, Carrs Mill Rd in mid-fall (**SDw**, ph.). Other reporters were **LCo**; **NM**; **INg**; **DKn**; **FLv**; **RSm**, **CRb**; *fide* **PWf**; and **m. obs.** (north TRIRS). The shrunken front pond at Western Regional Pk attracted 17 **Great Egrets** 8/5 (**KTf**, tied 2nd high). **Bald Eagles** were well-reported, especially near the central lakes and TRIRS. A peak day of **Broad-winged Hawk** migration, 9/18, found 568 over Centennial (**MKw**), 160 at Rockburn Branch Pk (**BO**, **EH**), and 92 at Schooley Mill Pk (**NM**). **Merlins** were seen at seven sites; **Peregrine Falcons** at four. A **Virginia Rail** at University of Maryland Central Farm (UMDCF) 10/18 was the lone 2010 record (**BO+**).

Shorebirds were exciting! Mudflats at the north end of TRIRS and a peninsula at Greenbridge enabled numerous observers to see species in two counties. Among the north end's best were **Western Sandpiper** 9/17 (**JSz**), 70 **Leasts** 9/17 (**JHf**, a new high), **White-rumped** 9/17 (**JHf**), **Baird's** 9/17 (**BHi**), 26 **Pectorals** 9/10 (**NM**, a new high with an additional 11 at Browns Bridge!), and 10 **Stilts** 9/30 (**BHi**, 2nd high). Greenbridge produced **Black-bellied Plover** 8/18 (**BHb**, **JSz+**), three **American Avocets** 8/17 (**B&GHi**, new high), **Ruddy Turnstone** 8/18

(**RR**, **BCe**), **Baird's Sandpiper** 9/12 (**JHb**), and eight **Short-billed Dowitchers** 8/18 (**RR**, **BCe**, a new high). An **American Golden-Plover** appeared at Fulton Pond 9/18 (**KS**); three **Western Sandpipers** were tabulated appropriately at Western RP 8/29 (**JSz**); 32 **Semipalmateds** congregated at Big Branch 9/13 (**JSz**, 2nd high) with 22 at Browns Bridge 8/12 (**BHi**, 3rd high); and a **Red Phalarope** appeared at Western RP 8/23 (**B&GHi**). Single **American Woodcocks** were detected at Elliott Rd Pond 10/5 (**MW**) and at Mt. Pleasant 10/24 (**TEv**).

A lone **Bonaparte's Gull** showed up at TRIRS 11/26 (**BHi**); three **Forster's Terns** appeared there 8/4 (**BHi**). A **Short-eared Owl** sailed near the intersection of MD32/Pfefferkorn Rd the late afternoon of 11/21 (**JSz**). Single **Black-billed Cuckoos** were noted at the Middle Patuxent Environmental Area (MPEA) 9/5 (**DHs**) and at Daniels 9/18 (**CSt**, **RBt**). A family of **Eastern Screech-Owls** lingered at River Rd, Sykesville in late Sept. (**FLv**). From 11/17 on, one roosted in a box at Talbots Landing (**R&JGu**). Two **Northern Saw-whet Owls** were detected 11/18 at Annapolis Rock Rd (**JSh**, **JCu+**). **Red-headed Woodpeckers** were reported by **BO**; **JW** (10/8, 10/22); and **SBg**, **WEb+**.

Yellow-bellied Flycatchers were noted from 8/20 Manahan Dr (**BO**, tied 2nd earliest) to 9/11 Schooley (**NM**). An **Alder Flycatcher** was spotted at Big Branch 8/24 (**JSz**) and one at Rockburn 8/28 (**JHf**). **Least Flycatchers** were seen from 8/22 MPEA (**JHf**, **JCu**) to 9/18 Daniels (**CSt**, **RBt**). Four prior early Nov. records for **Blue-headed Vireo** were upstaged

by two new late dates: 11/12 Allview (**ES**) and 11/14 Dunloggin (**KS**). **Philadelphia Vireos** were reported from 8/27 Rockburn (**BO**) to 9/19 Schooley (**BHb**); six on Howard Count Fall Count (HCFC) 9/18 tied the 1994 count high. A **Common Raven** was seen repeatedly in Sept. and Nov. at River Rd (**FLv**); other reports were from **KS** 8/1; **BHb** 9/19; **ROr**, **JS** 10/8; and **TFe** 11/1.

This was an invasion season for many northern species. **Black-capped Chickadees** were identified at Centennial 10/24 (**KS**), Thornbrook Dr 11/2 (**JCu**, ph), MPEA 11/2 (**JHf-2**), Dunloggin 11/14 (**KS**), and Annapolis Rock Rd 11/18 (**RR**, **JSh+-2**). An early **Red-breasted Nuthatch** at Sharp Rd 9/4 (**RSm**, **CRo**) was the first of many reports. A **Sedge Wren** was found at W. Friendship 10/10 (**BO**; later that day **JHf**, **JCu**). Single **Marsh Wrens** were spotted at Hanover Rd 9/18 (**BO**) and UMDCF 10/16 (**BO+**). One **Gray-cheeked Thrush** was at the Alpha Ridge Landfill 9/18 (**RC**); two were detected at Henryton 9/21 (**M&GMcC**). A **Gray-cheeked/Bicknell's Thrush** was noted 10/1 at MPEA (**JHf**). The description favored Bicknell's; the chip note was unfamiliar to the observer. Twenty-five **Gray Catbirds** were counted at Centennial 9/12 (**MKw**). A **Brown Thrasher** was still at MPEA 11/21 (**KS**, **WEb**). A rather early **American Pipit** was present at north TRIR 9/19 (**CSt+**). The high **Cedar Waxwing** count was 95 at Centennial 11/26 (**MKw**).

The only **Golden-winged Warbler** reported since 2008 was at MPEA 9/1 (**JHf**). A rather early

Tennessee was spotted at Rockburn 8/23 (**BO**). Four **Nashvilles** were at Schooley 9/24 (**NM**, tied high). Eight **Chestnut-sideds** at Rockburn 8/27 were nice (**BO**). A **Magnolia** was at the Elkhorn Garden Plots 11/1 (**JW**, 2nd latest). **Cape Mays** (up to six) were present at their usual elm tree at Wynfield Rd 9/18 to at least 10/13 (**RC+**). A f. **Black-throated Blue** at W. Friendship arrived 8/22 (**BO**, 2nd earliest). Two **Yellow-rumps** were at Centennial 9/12 (**MKw**, tied 2nd earliest); 40 there on 10/7 was the season's modest high (**J&TDC**). **Blackburnians** were seen from 8/27 at Rockburn (**BO**) to 10/3 at Mt. Pleasant (**KDy**, **JCu+**). **Palms** were noted from 9/11 at Gateway (2) and Elkhorn Garden Plots (1 Western) to 11/2 at Meadowbrook (1 Eastern) (all **JW**). **Bay-breasts** were noted from 8/27 Rockburn (**BO-2**) to 9/24 Schooley (**JSz-1**). The lone **Blackpoll** was identified 10/9 at Mt. Pleasant (**SBg**, **BO+**). Six **Black-and-whites** were tallied at MPEA 8/29 (**KS**). Three **Connecticut** sightings were more than usual: MPEA 9/5 (**JHf+**, 3rd earliest), Mt. Pleasant 10/2 (**BO**), and Centennial 10/7 (**J&TDC**). The first **Mourning** since 2008 was at Schooley 9/24 (**JSz**). Four **Wilson's** were reported: **SBg**, **HPt**, **SLv**; **BO**; **CSt**, **RBt**; **PWf**.

The first **American Tree Sparrow** was not detected until 11/20 at Mt. Pleasant (**KHf**, **KDy**, **JHf**). High **Chipping** counts were 60 at W. Friendship 10/24 (**JCu**, **JBy+**) and 78 at Schooley 11/7 (**NM**, 3rd highest). The two **Vesper** reports were W. Friendship 10/24 (**JCu**, **JBy+**) and Meadowbrook Pk 10/29 (**JW**). **LeConte's Sparrow**, a new county record, was clearly

the star of the season. After decades of searching, it was fitting that the species would be found on Sparrow Big Day, 10/16. The irony was that not one, but two, were located—one in the morning at MPEA (**BO** + 10 obs.), the second in late afternoon at Waterford Farm (**BO**, **JHf**, **KS**, **M&GMcC**). Both birds were photographed and details submitted to the MD/DCRC. At least one **Nelson's** was present at UMDCF from 10/16 (**BO+**) to 10/23 (**JHf**, **NM+**); the high was two on 10/18 (**BO+**). **Lincoln's** were well-reported from 9/18 M. Patuxent, Murray Hill (**JMcK**) to 10/28 Mt. Pleasant (**JCu**). The first **White-throated Sparrow**, M. Patuxent, Eden Brook (**J&TDC**), and an early **Dark-eyed Junco**, Daniels (**CSt**, **RBt**) both appeared on HCFC, 9/18.

The only **Summer Tanager** of the year was noted at Centennial 10/7 (**TDC**) breaking the previous 10/6/04 departure. A partly albinistic f. **Northern Cardinal** (white cheek patches) was seen at Dayton 11/25 (**TJh**). A **Blue Grosbeak** was still at Schooley 10/24 (**NM**, 2nd latest). The year's only **Dickcissel** was at Mt. Pleasant 10/9 (**KHf**, ph.). One to three **Eastern Meadowlarks** were reported from five sites. One or two **Rusty Blackbirds** were noted at four locations (**NM**; **BO** [2]; **JW**).

The first **Purple Finches** were a total of 12 on HCFC 9/18; seasonal reports came from at least 17 locations. **Pine Siskins** were first spotted 10/17 at Waterford (**BO+** 4); reports were from a minimum of 13 sites. Highs were ~20 Sandchain, E. Col 10/29 (**J&TDC**) and ~30 Manahan Dr 11/9 (**BO**). Sightings of both species dropped

after early Nov. About 60-70 **American Goldfinches** were counted at Mt. Pleasant 8/27 (**BO**); however, that number was low compared to the 300+ there 8/29 (**BO**, a new high).

Exotics: One **Black Swan** was at Barnes' Farm on MD94 in mid-Nov. (*vide* **WE**).

MARYLAND/DC ATLAS PUBLISHED

The *Second Atlas of the Breeding Birds of Maryland and the District of Columbia*, edited by Walter Ellison and published by Johns Hopkins Press, is now in print. This gorgeous book, the result of almost a decade of work by hundreds of people, was coordinated by an MOS committee chaired by Jane Coskren.

Howard County birders contributed in many ways to the successful completion of this atlas. In addition to dozens of people who collected data, others ran mini-routes, submitted photographs, assembled initial packets, maintained computer updates and maps, provided financial support, attended meetings, and wrote species accounts. Each was vital to the success of the project.

Most of the block captains and many who assisted in the field went far beyond the requested minimum coverage. The extraordinary intensity of the data collection was acknowledged on p. 28 under the Effort heading: "Howard County is recognized for achieving the most effort hours, and along with that, the most atlas confirmations per block." Of particular interest to county birders is Appendix C - Quarterblock Results. Maps for 12 species compare results from the three atlases in which this county has participated.

Our special thanks to each of you for your individual and collective contributions. You can be proud of the results!

2010 COUNTY ODONATE SURVEY

The biggest odonate news of the year was the listing of the Appalachian Snaketail (*Ophiogomphus incurvatus i.*) as a State Endangered Animal. Richard Orr's studies of this handsome small black and yellow dragonfly, found primarily near Savage, led to its classification.

The fifth annual Howard County Dragonfly Count held June 5, 2010 was coordinated by June Tveekrem. It was the most successful to date with 32 observers reporting a new high of 52 species! (Refer to the Sept/Oct 2010 *Goldfinch* for results.) The next count is planned for August 20, 2011.

In 2010, date extensions were recorded for the following: American Rubyspot 6/5 (Richard Orr), Swamp Spreadwing 6/5 (Wes and Sue Earp, Mike and Grazina McClure), Cyrano Darner 5/30 (RO, Jo Solem, Nancy Magnusson), Mocha Emerald 6/5 (RO) and 7/12 (RO, Bob and JS, GM)), and Autumn Meadowhawk 6/5 (W&SE, M&GM). New locations for unusual species included Gray Petaltail and Rapids Clubtail 6/8 (Sue Muller, RO+), Tiger Spiketail 7/12 (RO, B&JS, GM), and Brown Spiketail 6/5 (JS, NM, Pat Caro).

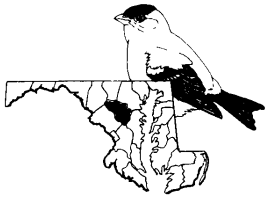

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HOWARD COUNTY GREENFEST 2011

County Executive Ken Ulman invites you to Howard County's third annual "GreenFest" on Saturday April 2nd from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Howard Community College. Sponsored by the Departments of Recreation & Parks and Planning and Zoning and the Bureau of Environmental Services, this free family event celebrates Earth Month. The theme for GreenFest is "Don't Waste Our Future: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle" and features displays to provide citizens with practical information for making choices to lead a more ecologically sound lifestyle – both at home and at the office.

The festival will also feature exhibits from community groups that focus on environmental awareness,

including the Howard County Bird Club. Other exhibitors include: Howard Astronomical League, Howard County Forestry Board, Howard County Conservancy, Sierra Club, Growth Adventures, Middle Patuxent Environmental Area, Master Gardeners, and the Howard County Climate Change Initiative, just to name a few.
