TRIADELPHIA CHRISTMAS COUNT

The Twenty-eighth Annual Christmas Bird Count for Triadelphia Reservoir was held on January 1, 1976. The 15 mile diameter circle is centered 3 miles ENE of Brighton Dam so includes parts of Howard and Montgomery County. We don't know whether the success of this count was due to good weather or fine coverage—maybe both—but a new record was set. The previous record was 90 species found in both 1973 and 1974. This year's total reached 97 species. I talked to Chan Robbins the night of the count and have only approximate totals as all birders had not yet turned in their tally. The final results of this and all other Christmas counts in North America will be published in the April 1976 issue of American Birds.

There are always an assortment of waterfowl found on the ponds and reservoirs (both Triadelphia and Rocky Gorge) and this year was no exception. Ten Horned Grebes, 58 Whistling Swans and 800 Canada Geese were all excellent counts. Cooper's Hawk was missed this year but 1 Rough-leg was seen. Bobwhites were rather low at 40 and Ring-necked Pheasants dropped to 3. Three snipe were a good find. Owls are never plentiful but small numbers of Screech, Great Horned and Barred Owls were found along with 1 Barn and 1 Saw-whet. Eight Pileated Woodpeckers made the list along with a lone Red-headed and 3 Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers. Horned Larks were up over 100 this year while Black-capped Chickadees invaded in numbers with a total near 70. The usual Carolina Chickadees ran around 800. Winter Wrens found were 20 while 3 individual parties found single House Wrens! Carolina Wrens were over 300. Two Catbirds and 2 Brown Thrashers were fine additions while 40 Robins are lingering for the winter. Hermit Thrushes were low with only 6 seen and a single Loggerhead Shrike made the list. Five thousand Starlings should make any birder's day...but the 68 Yellow-rumped Warblers were more pleasant to contemplate; interestingly, they almost all occurred in the Middle Patuxent River Valley. There were barely 100 E. Meadowlarks but one party had 59. One Rusty Blackbird was added to about 700 Redwings. Six parties had Evening Grosbeaks for a total of over 100. Purple Finches were at 30, House Finches 135 and 1 lone Pine Siskin showed up. Towhees were down this year with only 22 counted along with 4 Savannah Sparrows. The nearly 50 White-crowned Sparrows contrasted with over 2000 White-throats. Fox Sparrow was missed entirely. Three Phosbes were braving the winter along with 2 Chipping Sparrows.
